United Way has invested \$130,000 in this project over the past three years, working with partners such as the City of Columbus, Franklin County Educational Council, The Ohio State University and Columbus City Schools. Already, close to 1,500 staff members of after-school programs have received training, and 85 percent of them reported an increase in knowledge as a result of that training.

Know the contract: Professional behavior for administrators

There are ways to behave in a professional setting, and building administrators should follow these guidelines and not display displeasure with a teacher's work in front of staff, teachers, parents and students. Sections 404.02 and 404.06 of the CEA Master Agree*ment* stipulate the following:

A teacher shall not be given a formal written reprimand or warning, or be disciplined for any alleged infraction of rules, delinquency, or unprofessional performance, without just cause.

Since direct, verbal criticism of a teacher by an administrator in front of students or parents tends to reduce the teacher's effectiveness, parties agree that this practice should be avoided.

Administrators or other district representatives shall not subject members of the bargaining unit to repeated and/or extreme verbal abuse.

This is not intended to limit the right of the administrator to give direction to the teaching staff. But there are established procedures in place through which to handle problems. There are grievance procedures. Any teacher who feels criticism has been lodged inappropriately may request a conference with the administrator to discuss the incident and may include a representative from the superintendent's office and a representative from the Association.

Open enrollment for insurance benefits

The annual open enrollment period for insurance benefits is Oct. 15-Nov. 15. Insurance applications and waivers must be returned to the Benefits Office during the open enrollment period or no later than 30 days from date of hire. Failure to comply will result in loss of insurance benefits. If the application is not returned by the deadline, the employee must wait for the next open enrollment period to reapply.

Notification due to life changes (i.e., marriage, divorce, birth of a child, adoption and deaths) must be submitted to the benefits office within 30 days of the occurrence.

Columbus City Schools has been experiencing average annual medical claim expense increases of approximately 9.0 percent year after year. Market medical claim expense increases are around 7.5 percent to 9.5 percent. For prescription drug claim expenses, CCS has been experiencing average annual increases of approximately 14.1 percent year after year. Market prescription drug claim expense increases are around 10.5 percent to 14.5 percent. Based on this data, the insurance rates have calculated to the following

An additional amount of \$50,000 (or \$25,000, respectively) term life insurance may be purchased by the employee.

The Performance Advancement System (PAS) is a program for all members of the CEA bargaining unit to engage in classroom action research. Last school year, 172 members fully participated in the program, and 59 of the participants were engaged in replicating their successful projects from the year before. Sixty-four percent of the teachers replicating their projects posted mean student achievement gains greater than the district. This clearly shows that our teachers know how to make classroom action research work for improving student achievement.
